- Our topic for the Autumn term is Rocks and The Stone Age.
- ▶ English and maths will be taught in the mornings.
- P.E. is on Monday afternoons so the children need to come in their P.E. kits every Monday. Please ensure earrings are removed or covered and long hair is tied back. If your child requires an inhaler, please make sure it is clearly named and in date.

Reading

Reading is not only key to learning but is one of life's pleasures. Therefore, we cannot over emphasise the importance of regular reading and quality discussion.

Your child will be immersed in books in class: class novels linked to our topics, class novels at the end of the day, regular guided reading sessions in small groups at their level and of course, individual reading books.

Your child should be reading at home for about 30 minutes each night. If this is not possible one night, try to read a little more the next night or at the weekend. Try to find some time to listen to reading so that you are able to engage in meaningful discussion. Questions that involve an explanation rather than a one word answer are more beneficial.

Can your child support their opinion using evidence from the text? Are they beginning to use inference and deduction by looking beyond the literal and picking up more subtle clues? I have included some question prompts in their reading diaries.



Spellings

- Spelling should be steadily improving as a result of frequent reading.
- In class, children will be exploring spelling patterns, rules and exceptions in their grammar sessions.
- To support work in class, the children will receive spelling sheets each half term. These show which spellings your child needs to learn each week.
- Spellings will be tested every Friday. If your child struggles with spelling, encourage them to break the word up, use their phonics and look for any letter strings, prefixes and suffixes.
- Dictionaries are a good support for spelling and in acquiring new vocabulary.
- Try using mnemonics or making a 'tricky words' poster for the wall!



Times tables

- Statutory tests in times tables will take place in Year 4. The link below is a great way to practise and get a better understanding of the times table you're on. It is also good to start to practise mixed times tables to get the exposure and gain confidence.

- ▶ Times tables tests will take place every Friday. The expectation is that all children should know by heart up to and including 12 x 12 by the end of Year 4.

In class, the children will be practising and using their times tables in maths lessons.



Homework

- Children are expected to read daily and practise their spellings and multiplication facts regularly.
- They will also receive one piece of written homework each week. This will be given out on a Friday and is to be handed in on a Thursday.
- ► Each week, I will set a piece of Maths and English homework. If your child has difficulty with any homework, please annotate the homework so that we are aware. We can then find time to go over any misunderstandings. We are always pleased to receive any extra homework that children have chosen to do themselves in response to current class topics!
